A Club Member's Father's Legacy

Some club members know fellow long-time club members Angelika (Geli) and Craig Haviland. If not, you'll know a little bit more about them after reading this article. Geli is a lifelong avid motorcyclist who owns several motorcycles. She has two motorcycles with sidecar (Ural, BMW), and two motorcycles sans sidecar (Suzuki 750, BMW 650 GS). The purpose of this story is to introduce you to two 'new' motorcycles that just arrived on the U.S. Shores from Germany after many months in transit – and the history behind them. They have now made their way safely to Geli and Craig's basement!

Geli gained her love of motorcycles from her late father, Günther Holweg. Geli's father was born in 1937 in Germany and passed in early 2021. He is very missed. Günther Holweg was both an electrician and a carpenter in his successful professional career. But early in life he gained interest in practical mechanic work on motor vehicles (it was reported he never bought a new car), and eventually motorcycles (2 wheeled and with sidecars). Now we know why Geli has so many sidecars! As time went on, he became a renowned antique motorcycle restorer in his beloved Germany, focusing on German-built motorcycles. Geli recently shared with me several German motorcycle magazine articles that describe her father's amazing work. One of the articles, dated 2014, indicates that up to that time Günther had restored over 100 motorcycles since 1972! An amazing aspect of his work is that since most of the motorcycles he restored were VERY old (Pre-WW2, dating back to ~ 1901), he would fabricate all the parts he needed for the restoration. He was a true craftsman.

Geli and her brother are now in the process of dispositioning the many motorcycles their father had remaining in his basement workshop. Many completely restored. Some not yet finished. He always had plenty of backlog. Some will be kept in the family. The rest sold.

Over the years Günther would seek out old/broken motorcycles that needed significant restoration work. Apparently, he needed the challenge! In some cases he would restore bikes owned by others. In any case, some of his restorations were special to him and he kept them and rode them. Occasionally he would let Geli ride them when she was visiting home. Below is a summary of each 'new' bike in Geli's stable, with a little history about them.

1917 Harley Davidson Model J, with Sidecar

While Europe lay in ruins during the first World War, In the U.S. production of modern means of transportation flourished, including motorcycles. Until then, Harley-Davidson motorcycles were still considered a luxury product for well-off citizens. However, as the USA entered the war in April 1917, H-D recognized the use of such vehicles for modern warfare and convinced the US Military of its value in the war effort. Harley modified the model J by painting them olive-green, and attaching sidecars to make them more useful to the war effort. Even though the USA was involved in the war for only about a year and a half, every other motorcycle left the Harley Davidson factory as a war machine in 1917-1918. A total of 15,500 units of the 1000cc Model J with V2 four-stroke engine were shipped to the Western Front in the First World War. These were used predominantly by couriers or reporters running messages on the Western Front. These couriers had a high casualty rate. (Vince's note: my grandfather was one of these couriers – he survived the war). In some locations, machine guns were added to the sidecar and the rider would make strafing runs of the enemy.

One of these 15000 + H-D Model J's wound its way to the passionate motorcycle restorer/collector Günther Holweg aus Steinbronnen in 1990. He purchased it from someone in the Netherlands. Mr. Holweg spent over 600 hours in the restoration of this motorcycle. It was his favorite. He would ride this to motorcycle shows. In all, he rode the Model J over 20,000 kilometers. The longest trip he took was 575 kilometers. Pretty cool.

1919 Wanderer Model 2 1/2 PS

Wanderer was a German manufacturer of bicycles, motorcycles, automobiles, vans and other machinery. Established as *Winklhofer & Jaenicke* in 1896 by Johann Baptist Winklhofer and Richard Adolf Jaenicke, the company used the *Wanderer* brand name from 1911, making civilian automobiles until 1941 and military vehicles until 1945. Wanderer automobiles eventually became one of the four rings of 'Audi' (as we know it today). Wanderer was based in Chemnitz, Saxony – the city Geli's Mom was born. Small world.

Günther picked up the Wanderer in late 1976 for a price of 425 Deutsche Marks (DM). Again he spent over 600 hours restoring the Wanderer over a period of 15 months and completed work in early 1978. The before and after pictures are amazing - Günther again had worked his magic!

Geli's father advised her to ride the Wanderer since it was lighter and easier for her to ride at the time. Over time, while she lived in Germany and after moving to the USA and going back to visit, this was 'Geli's Bike'.

Motorcycle Training to Improve Rider Skills

I'm working with David Dunn and Mark Pederson to review available training courses and inform club members about them during the 1st Quarter 2022. We are currently researching possible use of the PA DMV Course (Advanced Rider Clinic – ARC), as a possible training activity for club members. Some information on it follows.

What is the ARC?

The Advanced Riding Clinic (ARC) is a motorcycle training course and is available to licensed motorcycle riders with intermediate skill level operating any street-legal two-wheel motorcycle that meets safety requirements. It is a nine-hour course consisting of approximately four hours of classroom activities and five hours of riding instruction. There is no formal skill evaluation (test). You must have your Motorcycle License and at least 3,000 miles of riding experience to participate in this course. And your own motorcycle. You can have an adult passenger with you for the course if you ride with a pillion.

What is the Cost of the ARC?

The ARC is FREE to Pennsylvania residents with a valid Pennsylvania Class 'M' driver's license.

The new(er) motorcycle safety training company for PA is American Motorcycle Training (AMT). They appear to offer the ARC class near Allentown at the following locations:

I contacted AMT and was given the following response on timing of class schedules and signing up: You may only sign up for classes 30 days or less in advance. Please be on the lookout for updates to the schedule as we get closer to March.

David Dunn is continuing to monitor MOA Foundation activities and will provide the club a list of other motorcycle training providers locations, dates, and costs for our use as well. Remember that the MOA foundation has a \$250 'Paul B Scholarship' for motorcycle training that we can each tap into for a course that charges. David Dunn and I will update on those courses and process for applying for scholarship 'free money' in an upcoming newsletter.

April 23, 2022 (Saturday) is Maintenance Day at Craig and Geli Haviland's!

Note that as of December 1 everyone can sign up for the National BMWMOA Rally that will be held in Springfield, Missouri from June 16-19, 2022.


